# **Snowy Range Scenic Byway**

The Great Sky Road



5 Days/4 Nights Gateway City: Laramie, Wyoming



Over 2 billion years ago, the white-capped Snowy Range Mountains were nothing more than specks of quartzite sand along a vast ocean. Then, the Earth's tectonic plates shifted, groaned, and collided with one another, such intense pressure was the sand that it metamorphosized into sandstone. It tilted along with the plates, forming an ancient mountain range which was soon buried underneath layers of time and rock. As the plates continued their tectonic dance, a younger and more fertile mountain range directly underneath the original ridge emerged. Millions of years of erosion, wind, and rain exposed the sparkling quartzite peaks we now call the Snowy Range. This fascinating geological history is on view along the Snowy Range Scenic Byway, a 29-mile road that traverses southeastern Wyoming's majestic Snowy Range Mountains. As you climb up and over the state's second highest mountain pass, discover a landscape that morphs from sagebrush prairies and lodgepole pine forests into an alpine tundra where snowfields glisten with the remains of last year's squall. Soar to nearly 10,000 feet in elevation on the route once named "the great sky road" and surround yourself with lush wildflower meadows that dot the valleys like confetti. Unbelievable landscapes, dramatic views, and spectacular geology are yours to experience along the route.




#### Touring the Byway

We recommend starting your journey in Laramie, a spirited town with deep Western roots. Discover the city's wild past on the Legends of Laramie Walking Tour, explore the 19th century Iverson House at the Laramie Plains Museum, and travel through time and space at the Geological Museum and Planetarium, both located on the beautiful University of Wyoming campus. Spend your first evening in a colorfully hand-crafted Victorian-style Inn.

On Day Two, travel to Centennial, a quaint mountain town full of rich history, tasty food, and local characters. Learn of the region's unique past at the Nici Self Historical Museum, catch a breath of fresh pine forest air on the Libby Creek Trail and at Barber Lake, and hear about the care of wild horses at Deerwood Ranch Wild Horse EcoSancturay before relaxing on the porch of a historic hotel. Make sure your gas tank is full before you leave Centennial, because you're in for a real treat on Day Three as you begin your drive on the Snowy Pass Scenic Byway! Twist and turn your way through the Medicine Bow-Routt National Forest, past crystal clear alpine lakes like Brooklyn Lake, Mirror Lake, and Lake Marie, reach an elevation of over 10,000 feet at Snowy Range Pass, the apex of the Byway, and enjoy panoramic views of three different mountain ranges at the Libby Flats Observation Area. Afterwards, enjoy a full range of exciting experiences and dining opportunities at Saratoga Hot Springs Resort.

On Day Four brings you can explore Saratoga, a small town with big scenery, learn about the area's diverse geological history at the Saratoga Museum, and take a dip into healing thermal waters at Saratoga Hobo Hot Springs. Continue north on WY-130 for the Overland Trail Historical Marker, which memorializes the famous 19th century wagon trail, then head east on transcontinental I-80 for a stop at Fort Fred Steele State Historic Site, an 1868 railroad fortress. As you finish up this amazing tour, on Day Five see over one hundred years of history come to life at Elk Mountain Museum and if you did not dine there last evening, have a bite to eat at the Crossing Cafe at the Elk Mountain Trading Company. From there, we wish you a safe passage if you're continuing your journey on another Wyoming Scenic Byway, or a safe and pleasant journey home.



# DAY ONE



#### Laramie

Situated on the high plains in southeastern Wyoming, Laramie, which has been the site of human activity for more than 10,000 years, is surrounded by forests and mountains. Native Americans hunted big game here before French-Canadian fur trapper Jacques La Ramee arrived in about 1817. Settlers began arriving in 1862 on Ben Holladay's Overland Stage line. Today, this diverse town is home to the only university in Wyoming, with six museums, a historic downtown with quaint shops, unique boutiques, restaurants, breweries, and cafés. You'll find the "Gem City of the Plains" brimming with Western influence and hospitality.

#### Historic Downtown Walking Tour

Explore the historic remnants of this former "hell-on-wheels" town, where Laramie's first citizens made their mark, while imagining you just arrived here more than a century ago when the train comes in. Pick up a brochure at the Laramie Visitor Center for the 33 stop walking that begins as Garfield and First Street.

### Laramie Plains Museum at Historic Ivinson House

The beautiful three story Queen Anne Victorian the first "trophy" house built in the University Historic District, by Edward and Jane Ivinson in 1892 which led to the historic architecture of Laramie of today. ## **University of Wyoming Planetarium**

A facility of the University of Wyoming Department of Physics and Astronomy, The UW Planetarium is a unique place to explore the night sky, using a Spitz starball, a precisely constructed optical/mechanical system that projects an accurate view of the night sky as viewed from anywhere on Earth. ## **University of Wyoming Geological Museum**

The museum presents a view of the diverse geology of Wyoming with more than 50,000 cataloged fossil, rock, and mineral specimens. A 75-foot Brontosaurus skeleton dominates the museum's exhibit hall. "Big Al," is the most complete Allosaurus fossil ever found. Samuel H. "Doc" Knight, the legendary Wyoming geologist, painted one of the museum's large murals and the large, copper-plated Tyrannosaurus rex that stands outside.

# DAY TWO

## Deerwood Ranch Wild Horse EcoSanctuary

#### Centennial

This quaint mountain town of 300 residents, is the gateway to Wyoming's beautiful Snowy Range Mountains. Early Plains Indians passed through here looking for wood for teepee poles and bows, before a railroad tie camp was established in 1868. The first homestead was staked out in the valley in 1870, and gold was discovered in 1875. Both the town and the mine were named in honor of America's 100th birthday. As mining declined, ranchers and loggers kept the town alive until the railroad from Laramie to Centennial and breathed new life into the old work camp site. A newspaper, bank, hotel, fish hatchery, store, and two saloons were constructed in 1876.

#### Nici Self Historical Museum


The Centennial Depot, which also served as the post office and grocery store, was built in 1907 for the Laramie, Hahns Peak and Pacific Railway. ### Libby Creek Trail

The stunning landscapes along this four-mile loop trail start from the Green Rock Trailhead and climb fairly quickly to the ridge mostly through forest with intermittent views of meadows, flowers, streams, and forested hillsides. Centennial, WY, 82055

# DAY THREE

## **Snowy Range Visitor's Center**

The perfect stop for information while driving the Snowy Range Scenic Byway, built from beetle-killed pine salvaged from trees on site. There is a pollinator garden, short walking trail, picnic tables, interpretive signage and maps. 
### **Brooklyn Lake**

Tucked away in the forest, this small, picturesque lake, at an elevation of 10,500 feet, lies in the shadow of the snow-capped Browns Peak. National Forest Service Road 315, lake and campground open seasonally July 15-October 1

### Libby Flats Observation Area

Enjoy views south to Rocky Mountain National Park, west toward Medicine Bow Peak, the Sierra Madre Mountains, and Mt. Zirkel Wilderness Area, and east toward the Laramie Mountains.

#### **Snowy Range Pass**

At 10,895 feet, majestic Snowy Range Pass is said to be the state's second highest. The road itself, built in the 1870s as a wagon road, and paved in the 1930's, was originally called the "Great Sky Road." The pass is named for the large amounts of snow that remain at high elevations during the summer months. Even though the road to the summit, with awe-inspiring sweeping views, is a two-lane paved road, with a steep incline, it is suitable for all vehicles.

## **Medicine Bow Peak**

Soaring to 12,018 feet, the highest peak in the Snowy Range is visible from Snowy Range Pass. Before John Frémont;s expeditions of 1833-1834, Native Americans used the mountain passes as travel routes. Engines and other fragments of the United Airline Flight 409 that crashed here in 1955 are still present. A memorial known as "Disaster Wall", was placed in 2001.

## **Mirror Lake**

If you brought a picnic with you, enjoy it at the picnic tables here with a side of scenic views, before taking the short easy walking trail to the West Lake Marie Trailhead.



## Lake Marie

A short trail traces the perimeter of the lake, while another trail leads to the mountaintops here.

#### **Brush Creek Visitor Center**

#### Saratoga

If you're a lover of quaint towns, this jewel of a town located between the Snowy Mountain Range and Sierra Madre Range, will be a favorite. Saratoga's famous mineral hot springs and thermal waters were well known to Native Americans before 1838, when the first settlers, mountain men and trappers worked their way west. They quickly began "taking the waters" for health, adding a bathhouse to accommodate visitors.

#### Saratoga Museum

Housed in Saratoga's original 1915 Encampment Railroad Depot, exhibits range from Wyoming's pioneer settlers to an original one-room cabin featuring a blacksmith collection.

# DAY FIVE

## Elk Mountain

A quaint, little town nestled in the cottonwoods along the Medicine Bow River, Elk Mountain was named after Sioux Chief Standing Elk. Trappers of the Ashley-Smith expedition first traveled through here in 1825, paving the way for Medicine Bow Valley settlements. Immigrants from Finland, Sweden, and other European countries traveled here to work in the timber, mineral, and ranching industries, bringing a rich diversity of cultures and traditions. Though many of the settlements in the area are now ghost towns, Elk Mountain has adapted through changing times.

### Elk Mountain Museum

From the time the trappers of the Ashley-Smith expedition arrived, settlements here have played an important role in opening the way for travelers making their way west. Collections and displays include the famous Garden Spot Pavilion, the historic Elk Mountain Hotel, Old Carbon, Percy, Fort Halleck, the legendary tiehacks, Elk Mountain schools, pioneer ranches and the characters that made it all happen.
